We have been inspired by Jinx's mahi to make our own simple kaleidoscopes that create fun night-time lights.

Night-time kaleidoscopes: playing with light & shadow



EQUIPMENT YOU WILL NEED:

- Cardboard tube/s
- Clear coloured plastic or cellophane (we used office file pockets).
- Scissors and clear tape
- Permanent markers (optional)
- Stickers (optional)
- Coloured or patterned paper and tape to decorate your kaleidoscope (optional)
- A torch or a cellphone with a light



STEP 1: Cut strips of plastic or cellophane.

STEP 2:

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Arrange the strips over the top end of your tube and play around with your design. Overlap the colours in some areas to create more colours.



STEP 3: Tape down the plastic strips to the sides of the tube as shown here.

FUN FACT: The worlds's biggest kaleidoscope is made from an old barley silo in Mount Tremper, New York. The walk-in kaleidoscope can hold 20 adults at a time.

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STEP 4:

Run a piece of tape along the rim of the tube to fully secure the strips in place.



STEP 5: Optional

Wrap the tube in coloured or patterned paper and secure with tape to decorate the outside of your kaleidoscope.



STEP 6: Optional Add tiny stars or other shapes to the kaleidoscope - we used stickers.



OTHER OPTIONS: If you don't have coloured plastic you can cover the end of the tube in clear tape and add coloured paper cutouts.

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Another great option is to draw a design directly on to clear tape using colourful permanent markers.

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STEP 7: Grab a torch or a cell phone and turn the lights off! Shine the torch through the tube to project your design onto the ceiling and walls.



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STEP 8: Ka pai to mahi, well done! Have fun playing with light and shadow.
